Dear Parents of our Multicultural Students,

Thank you for trusting Multicultural Academy with your child.

It was a pleasure meeting all of you who attended the Math Curriculum Day/Fall Festival. Events are a great way to meet and greet, and outreach in the community.

Academically, our teachers invest in formative assessments throughout each unit and daily lessons so that they have a strong understanding of what each child needs. This information helps our staff to provide an appropriately challenging learning experience. At Multicultural Academy, we believe that developing the whole child is essential to developing citizens that can move forward in life and be productive contributors to the world. Our students have the potential to create and imagine anything and they are our future entrepreneurs and leaders. Preschool Classroom

Preschool students have settled nicely into our classroom routines! This past month, we focused on using materials in our art and writing centers. Children made autumn leaf collages, painted with watercolors, and learned how to use crayons, markers, and glue. We also learned to identify emotions, and what to do when feeling excited, sad, angry, or scared.

As always, outdoor exploration is an important part of our curriculum. We encourage you to dress children in clothing appropriate for outdoor play - i.e. clothes and sneakers you don't mind getting dirty. As the weather gets colder, please send your child to school with a coat, hat, and mittens, and store a weatherappropriate change of clothing in your child's cubby. We spend time learning outdoors every day!

We are collecting items for several classroom projects. We ask that you bring in a family photo with your child to display on the classroom wall. We also encourage you to share a photo of your child's favorite rooms or objects in your house, as well as a photo of your front door, so that we can create personalized blocks for our block center!

A few other reminders: the earliest drop-off time is 8:30 am and we ask that you pick up your child promptly at 3:30 pm. Please don't send food and toys from home to the classroom.



Kindergarten/First Grade Classroom

Dear Parents/Guardians,

I can't believe it's already November! This school year is flying by. I'm so excited for what we're going to be learning over the next month.

ELA: In Kindergarten, we will be continuing to practice our letters and our letter sounds. We will also be working very hard to read with sight words and to sound out CVC words. So far, the Kindergarten class is catching on to reading very quickly, and we are super excited to see them grow as the school year continues. We will also be working on our writing skills by first labeling objects and then by writing short sentences. In First Grade, we will continue to work on blending words as well as working on more complicated aspects of phonics such as blends, substitutions, and deletions. We are also going to be learning about putting things in alphabetical order. In our writing, we will be working on differentiating between declarative, interrogative, and exclamatory sentences and will be continuing to write our own sentences. We plan to start our writing journals this month.

<u>Math:</u> In Kindergarten, we are beginning to learn about numbers over ten. We are really going to focus on counting to fifty by ones and on counting to 100 by tens. Soon, we will be starting the basics of adding and subtracting.

In First Grade, we are beginning to study addition and subtraction strategies. Up to this point, we have been focusing on adding and subtracting numbers ten and under, but are now ready to move on to bigger numbers and will be working on adding and subtracting up to twenty. We will also be working on fluency with some of our basic math facts.

Science: This month in science, we are going to discuss a unit of science called "Force Olympics: Forces, Machines, and Engineering." We recently started this unit and have really enjoyed pretending to be different machines that we see on construction sites. We are so excited to continue these activities and learn more about the way the world around us works!

<u>Social Studies:</u> In the month of November, we will continue our discussion of how to be a good citizen. Additionally, we will be talking about being thankful and discussing things that we are thankful for.

This month is going to be our best one yet!

Make sure your child studies the spelling words for the test. Also please make sure the reading log is turned in each Monday.

In Science, we are still learning more about plants and how they grow. In Social studies we have been learning about maps and globes. We are making a book about map skills.

Coming Up

We have some tests coming up in the first full week of November. We have been working hard on our studies of the way the Earth changes. Next Thursday we will be having a test over plate tectonics, earthquakes, tsunamis and volcanoes.

We also have been working hard on discovering what Historians, Geographers, Economists and Political Scientists ask when they research a topic.

That test will be on Tuesday the first week of November.

After that we will move into learning about the regions of the United States. We will be focusing on mapping and the different characteristics that make each region special.

In science we will be moving from volcanoes, to rocks and how they are formed, and the many kinds of rocks and weathering. In Math we will be starting multiplication, including finding the area. Look for number cards to come home for practicing our basic tables.



FIFTH GRADE CLASSROOM

Hello Families,

We've made it through the first full Month of the school year! Thank you for all your support and involvement with your 5th grader so far, it has been greatly appreciated. Here is a quick rundown of my classwork and homework schedule/policy, to make sure we are all on the same page. Please ask your child daily about homework.

<u>Word Study:</u> We have been working with a spelling list for two weeks. They receive the word list on Monday and then have a spelling test the following Friday.

<u>ELA:</u> An ELA packet is sent home every Monday (sometimes Tuesday, if I forget :)) It is due the Friday of that same week. They also will get a cursive worksheet on Tuesday that is due on Thursday.

Math: We have a math packet that is sent home on Friday to work on over the weekend and is due on Monday when they return to school.

Science: We are continuing with more and more lessons in Mystery Science. Any science homework that might ever come home, is work they didn't finish in class.

<u>Social Studies:</u> We are starting our study of another Native American Tribe to settle in the U.S. They are the Inuit Tribe. We will learn about six tribes total. Again any social studies homework they may have, is work they didn't finish in class.

Classroom Management: If you have not joined class dojo, please do so. I often will send messages through dojo when needed regarding your child's behavior throughout the day. I have been choosing 2-3 students almost every day to get a "Happy Call" home. If I am not able to make a "Happy Call" I will let you know through dojo. "Happy Calls" are a positive reinforcement for good behavior in the classroom. Our goal is to receive a "Happy Call" instead of a "sad call" for misbehavior.

This is just a brief snapshot of what we have had going on in 5th grade.

Math Content 6th Grade:

Your child is learning about ratios and how to use ratio language to describe the relationship between two quantities. He or she will solve real-world problems by making tables of equivalent ratios, finding missing values in the tables, and plotting pairs of values on the coordinate plane.

7th Grade Math Content:

Your child is learning to solve problems involving proportional relationships. He or she is learning how to identify and use unit rates, determine whether relationships are proportional, and use proportional thinking.

8th Grade Math Content

Your child is learning to interpret, represent, and solve multistep equations in mathematical and real-world contexts. Your child is also studying graphs and equations of lines in the coordinate plane and learning to identify slopes and y-intercepts.

Middle School Science

Dear Families,

6th Grade: In the Month of November, we will be discussing the conservation of energy law, discussing in detail the three methods of heat transfer: conduction, convection and radiation. Then we will be discussing how energy can transfer from a form to another form. Other forms of energy would be discussed as Mechanical, sound and light energy. 7th Grade: They will be finishing the scientific project and covering the concepts of Physical and Chemical reactions. We will be having detailed discussions about the formation of the precipitate and its implications in the chemical and physical processes; we would start discussing the acidity indicator (ph) and its several applications.

8th Grade: We will be finishing the scientific project and covering the interactions between the four Earth systems: Geosystem, hydro-system, Biosystems, and Atmosphere.




